Kids Are Us

St. James' recently held two events that intentionally included parishioners of all ages: the All Saints forum and the Christmas Pageant.

On All Saints Sunday, November 2, between services, Matt Cornish and I led an intergenerational forum in which about 20 participants (ranging in age roughly from 7 to 75) crafted "prayer flags" to commemorate someone who is a "saint" to them. While crafting, we conversed about who we had chosen and why. Some flags honored someone well known (such as Dietrich Bonhoeffer), but the majority honored a family member. From youngest to oldest, we learned things about one another that we would never have learned otherwise. While crafting a flag for my grandmother Vivian, I told high-schooler Alex a story about her that I myself had almost forgotten. During the 10:15 service sermon time, when participants were asked to share who they picked and why, grade-schooler Grace stood up next to her dad, Bill, and explained why he was her saint. It was a touching and priceless moment.

As for the December 14 Christmas Pageant, most of you were there! Second only to Easter, it was by far our biggest Sunday attendance of the year. We used a new pageant script, one that wonderfully incorporated our all-ages congregation. When the first narrative started—the moment Jim stood at the lectern wearing a "shepherd costume"—I got teary and stayed that way throughout. We canceled the 8 o'clock service that day so that everyone could gather together. That was a sacrifice for some, but most of the feedback was positive. Several people told me how glad they were that they "had" to attend the pageant, because they enjoyed it so much.

We were blessed on Christmas Pageant Sunday, as we are most Sundays, to see our church filled with people all ages. Visit many churches these days, and you see mostly older people. Without younger congregants, those churches

might not be around much longer. But that's not the only or the most important reason to be grateful for our all-ages congregation. Those of us on the far side of middle age (and that includes me) surely would be poorer without the wonderful vibrancy injected by our children, youth, young adults, and young parents. We surely are poorer when we choose to stick to ourselves, skipping opportunities to develop relationships with those across even the farthest generations. It really does take a village to raise a child, but it's not just about the children. Mixing between the generations is good for us all.

Elsewhere in this issue of The Network you will read about the closing of the nursery. This does not reflect a reduced commitment to our children—if parents ask for it, we will bring it back. It simply reflects the reality that the nursery hasn't been used for at least a year and a half. We actually have children young enough for the nursery, but the parents are bringing them to church, and that's even better. Their presence among us is a blessing to us all. And in my experience, no one is too young—or too old—to participate in church.

At the Christmas Pageant, a highlight for me was the final musical piece, which included four stanzas. The first stanza was sung by the adult choir, the second by the choristers, the third by the children's choir, and the fourth by the entire assembly. It was so sweetly beautiful and so wonderfully symbolic: each of us, of every age, comes bearing unique gifts, and then we offer them together for the glory of God.

Vestry Update

Happy New Year from the Vestry!

In December the vestry discussed and acted on three areas: Annual Meeting Format, the 2015 budget, the Nursery, the next steps in the transition process. Here are the updates:

- Annual meeting format will remain the same, with the meeting happening after a shortened 10:15 service. We plan to have an activity for the kids so that the parents can participate in the meeting. We will not print out copies of the Annual Reports in an effort to save money, staff time and the environment. We ask parishioners to print your own copy OR if you are not able to or need help, contact Jodi in the church office and she will be glad to print one out for you.
- The 2015 budget was worked on, reviewed line by line, adjusted, and approved by the vestry at the December 15th meeting. Due to the pledging being less than last year, we made expense cuts to several areas. We decided that Art in the Abbey can fund the entire Outreach of the parish, given its second year success. And the vestry recommends that the Outreach committee use some of their funds to fund the Shawl Ministry, since the Shawl Ministry provides outreach to many groups outside the parish. More detail on the budget will be discussed at the Annual Meeting.
- As part of the 2015 budget cuts, it was decided that we would no longer continue to employ two caregivers for the Nursery. As of the first week in January the nursery will be closed. The fact is that no child has used the Nursery for the past 18 months. We came close to making this decision last year at budget time, and decided to give it one more

- year. And we have had feedback that most parents do not want to leave their kids in a nursery, but keep them with them in church. The vestry has asked the Newcomers Committee to keep us posted if the flow of nursery age kids (under age three) grows. If that happens, we can look at adding volunteer and/ or paid positions. Under the safe church requirements there must be two adults working with kids at a minimum.
- The new rector search will continue this month. The Recruitment Committee will be presented a new list of candidates in the first part of January and has a streamlined process in place to meet and interview them. It is planned that the vestry will make the final interviews and decision sometime in March. Watch the email blast and the website for updates, or ask the Recruitment Team or vestry members about their progress.
- As we move into the New Year we have much to be thankful at St. James'. We are in the midst of God's work inside and outside the church walls. We have a talented staff, a strong sense of lay ministry, a wonderful mix of generations, and an amazing facility. It will be exciting to see where God leads us in 2015.

What is God calling you to do in 2015? Let us each listen and ACT.

The 2015 Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration will focus on the music of the civil rights movement and how that music—whether freedom songs, folk songs, spirituals or hip hop—has been an integral part of the American struggle for human rights and social equality. The program will showcase the music of the movement in its historical context through performance, narration and multi-media presentations.

Performers will include the Glastonbury Naubuc School Early Bird Choir, the Glastonbury High School Jazz Orchestra, and the Glastonbury High School Madrigal singers. Frank Mitchell, assistant director and curator/curator at large of The Amistad Center for Art & Culture at the Wadsworth Atheneum, will provide the historical backdrop for the musical performances.

The program is free and open to the public. Those attending are asked to bring a nonperishable food item to benefit the Glastonbury Food Pantry.
