Wasn't it just Christmas? Or, at least just the Epiphany? Now we are planning Lent. Yes, Lent begins very early this year. Easter cannot be earlier than March 22nd and this year it makes it by 5 days, as Easter falls on March 27th. But before we get to Easter, we observe the Holy Season of Lent.

This year we have several things planned to help make our Lenten journeys intentional and a time set apart from our normal days, weeks, and busy lives. Lent is often marked as a time that people give something up, something that seems like a sacrifice. For instance, sweets, chocolate, wine and other such things are often forsaken during the 40 days of Lent. And while giving something up can be a very holy offering for Lent, I also think that taking something on can be a way to make Lent a holy season.

For example, doing a random act of kindness each day, clearing the clutter from your life and getting rid of something you own each day and giving it to someone who can use it, attending a daily worship service, adding daily prayer to your life. These are things we can take on instead of giving up that put us in mind of God in new and different ways.

At St. James' we will be doing a few things differently to mark Lent. Our artist will be transforming our church for the Lent Season to make the space reflect the season. Our worship services will be a bit different, as well.

For the first Sunday in Lent, we will process in to the Great Litany. Each Sunday after that, we will process in silence. We will sing our closing hymn in place and then process out during the Postlude (the piece Jim plays after the closing hymn). This will help us to keep a bit of holy silence in our worship each week. It also means we won't do announcements; they will ALL be in the bulletin. We will also not do birthday and anniversary blessings.

We won't be ignoring February and March birthdays, instead, <u>all February birthdays and anniversaries will</u> be blessed on February 7th and all March birthdays on March 27th.

We will also be offering a time for you to put daily worship into your life during Lent by offering Morning Prayer weekdays at 7:00AM. This could be a time for you to worship before going to work, or a nice way to start your day. I know it's early, but it is only for a season and could be the thing you are adding to your time with God during Lent.

Whether you choose to give something up or take something on, I hope you will find something during this Season of Lent that allows you to mark this time with prayer, quiet, self-sacrifice and an openness of mind and spirit that will ready you for the joy of the resurrection on Easter Day.



Prayer Hikes

A prayer hike is a meandering in the woods with time for guided reflection and prayer woven into the beginning, middle, and end, centered around a theme having to do with creation.

Generally, the hike is about a mile long and takes about an hour. We move at a slow pace on easy terrain to give room for meditation and to make the experience accessible to all kinds of hikers.

Each month we will travel to a different nearby park or forest. We meet on the first Sunday of the month with the exception of February in which we meet on the second Sunday due to the Super Bowl!
