Resettlement of Refugees from Afghanistan

St. James' **Faith in Action** team is very excited to be joining with several other faith communities and organizations from Glastonbury and nearby towns to form a Co-Sponsorship group to resettle a family who has been <u>recently</u> <u>evacuated from Afghanistan</u>. The apartment we have for them is located in Manchester, so we will be working on settling them there.

As you can imagine, this effort will require many volunteers. We will need to help them with everything from getting settled in their apartment to finding jobs, helping kids enroll in schools, help with finding English classes, getting to medical appointments, and so much more.

Integrated Refugee & Immigrant Services (IRIS) is the organization that we are working with. They provide all of the informational resources and training to help us prepare and get ready. Once we are a little further along, we will complete our application and once we are approved, will continue preparing until we are ready to take the family within 48 hours. At the point that we are ready, we will let IRIS know and we will then be assigned our family.

If you would like to help with this initiative, you will be required to attend the IRIS training. It is 3 evenings (2 hours each) on Zoom. The next training is in mid-November. St. James' has joined in with the folks from following communities to form a Co-Sponsorship group that we are temporarily calling the "Glastonbury/Manchester Group" (a better name is TBD):

"Help Feed The Hungry" Ministry

For many years, St. James' parishioners have supported a two-part program supplying food to many of our less-fortunate neighbors in Glastonbury and Hartford. One aspect, in which all of us can participate directly, is the *collection of non-perishable food items*. When you come to church, you can deposit your contributions into the baskets in the foyer – on the left, just before you enter the sanctuary. Prior to the COVID disruptions, these donations were taken weekly to the Glastonbury operation has been suspended temporarily, but MANNA has continued in service. MANNA is a program of Hands On Hartford, which was founded 52 years ago by eight downtown-Hartford congregations to serve Hartford's needy folk. **Hands on Hartford** provides many other services relating to food, housing and health. You can learn more at handsonhartford.org.

The other aspect of this ministry involves the Panera Bread bakery in Glastonbury. Each Sunday evening, the Glastonbury Panera bakery donates its surplus bread products (Panera refers to them as "Dough Nations[®]"), which are delivered to Hartford each Monday by our loyal volunteers (Blakeley and Rick Crevoiserat, Mike Berdan, Debbie and John O'Donnell, David Buddington). <u>We would welcome another delivery volunteer</u>, especially to give us more options during the summer. *Bread is picked up at Panera at 8:00 p.m. Sunday and delivered to MANNA on Monday*. This was Bishop Douglas' last time to serve as Bishop Diocesan in convention as we prepare to elect a new bishop this spring. Highlights included the worship service, the annual Bishop's Address, beautiful musical and liturgical dance and a tour of the wonderful new space at the Cathedral. Joyfully, two Intentional Episcopal Communities were recognized. Legislatively, we voted and approved 7 resolutions. Jesse Trees

Jesse Trees are a very old Christmas Tradition and first started in medieval times. They are used to help tell the story of the Bible from creation to the Christmas Story. The Tree of Jesse is a depiction in art of the ancestors of <u>Jesus Christ</u>, shown in a branching tree that rises from <u>Jesse</u> of <u>Bethlehem</u>, the father of <u>King David</u>. It is the original use of the <u>family tree</u> as a graphic representation of a <u>genealogy</u>.

For years, we have had a Jesse Tree in our Church. Each week during Advent, our Sunday School Children would learn about one of the Bible Stories leading up to the birth of Jesus and an ornament would be used to depict that story. The children would then come into church at The Peace and place their ornaments on the tree. After The Peace, one of the children would tell the Congregation what the ornament represented.

This year we are expanding our Jesse Tree experience. Because due to Covid not many of our children are in church on Sundays, we are going to have each family create an ornament that Mitch Chester will then pick up and bring to church for our church tree each week. We will also all have the opportunity to create our own Jesse Trees at home. **On Sunday**, **November 21st and 28th** you can pick up a "tree" and all you need to create your weekly ornaments.
