

RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

It is always a little strange for me to be writing a piece for the newsletter so far in advance of the season in which it will be published. I write this at the end of July for the September newsletter, not unlike the Bible when passages were written at a specific time and are now being read by people far removed from that time. Although Paul was absolutely writing to a specific group to deal with a particular issue, and the writers of the Gospels were writing for a particular audience, they had to have some hope that future generations would read their words, and perpetuate the message of Jesus Christ.

It is hard to write with the future in mind. We can address what we hope might be relevant, but we can't be sure. Questions arise such as - Will readers understand this reference? What new event or tragedy will have happened that would be better addressed? This is the beauty and the struggle with Scripture. Although the truths revealed to us in Scripture never change, finding those truths can sometimes be challenging; the stories used to illustrate those truths, although perfectly clear and understandable to first century listeners, are not so clear to those of hearing them today.

It is why engaging in Bible study is so very important. Our vision statement says we are a community that takes our faith journeys seriously. In order to do that, we need to be firmly grounded in the truths of Holy Scripture. We need to be clear about who Jesus is so we can better know who WE are, and who we strive to be. We need to hear how we are being challenged to grow and change, because no matter how long we

have been on this journey, each of us is still a work in progress. We need to understand who we are individually <u>and</u> as a community of faith. We need to know how we are to live in this world, and that corporate worship (regular church attendance) is important but it is not enough. There has to be an intentional practice of reading, learning, sharing and struggling with this stuff.

I am encouraging you, challenging you, to commit to one thing this Fall that will help you along this journey. Attend the Sunday 9:00 a.m. Bible Study. Join the Thursday Morning Book Group. Attend the Wednesday Evening Adult Formation. Come to the 5th Sunday Breakfasts. Start a group of folks who might want to meet monthly for dinner and some Bible study (I'd be happy to come along!) Be someone who catches the vision God has for us at St. James' Church and take your faith journey seriously.

Candidate for Holy Orders in the Episcopal Church in Haiti

Guimond will be here until May, 2018 to complete a Master's Degree Certificate Program at Hartford Seminary. While here, Guimond will be a part of our St. James' community. Guimond was born into a modest family. He has three brothers and one sister and he is the third child. His mother is a shopkeeper and his father, a farmer. Acquiring an education was not easy for his parents and that is why they are Guimond's "first heroes." He completed primary school and high school in his hometown where an Episcopal priest made education possible. After the completion of high school in 2007, the same people paid his tuition to attend University to learn Accounting and complete a Bachelor's degree.

As Guimond grew up, he watched Father Albert in his ministry and was "impressed, astonished and affected by his wonderful ministry" and Guimond decided to become a priest. He entered the seminary in November, 2011 and met the Rev. Denise Cabana. Since then, they have remained good friends. When he learned of the "International Peacemaking Program" at Hartford Seminary, he applied and was admitted to *Hartford Seminary* to start a nine-month study. He will return to serve his Haitian diocese with more skills and abilities.

Guimond writes, "(the) Rev. Cabana and Saint James' Episcopal Church in Glastonbury was the helping hand who had made this possible and to whom I will always remain thankful. I just turn 29. Looking back to my life as an episode, I realize how blessed I am. So I want and decide to become a blessing to everyone I meet to the measure of my possibility, by being present. I thank God for everyone he has placed on my road and the ones I will meet in the future. Thank you everyone! I love you all!"

Guimond begins his journey with St. James' on August 27, 2017.

THE PARISH GUIDING TEAM?

It's a reasonable question to ask, 'What is the Parish Guiding Team' and what is the 'Living Local: Joining God' initiative? What's the purpose; what is this group up to? While the group labels may sound like another recruitment or church growth strategy from the diocese, this project seeks another kind of outcome. The St. James' group is one of five churches in Connecticut (Trinity Lime Rock, Trinity Southport, Christ Church New Haven, St. John's Essex) and dioceses in East Tennessee, Maine, Newark, and Southwestern Virginia that are rethinking the missions of our churches.

Our society has been changing since the 1960s and our traditional church congregations do not play a central role. There are less of us that come into our church buildings. But, God's work has continued outside of the church, in our communities, as well as with our St. James' congregation. Although St. James' welcomes neighbors into our established church, D. Zscheile explains, "...the church can not expect people to listen to its teachings without first engaging people where they are" (2014, p.66).

In order to build skills of our Christian practice, we need to learn to deeply listen to each other to discover what God is up to in each other's lives. St. James' started by expanding the practice of "Dwelling in the Word." By rehearing the gospel and listening to each other's stories, we sought to better connect with one another. To better follow Jesus, our next step is to listen to each other's stories, hopes, struggles, and dreams and to practice deep listening with neighbors, in order to discuss real and complex problems.
