





“Spring” Cleaning

I must admit that I am a person who enjoys spring cleaning—most particularly, spring de-cluttering. Culling and organizing give me a concrete sense of accomplishment. Perhaps that is why I have been just a tiny bit obsessive about cleaning out the church basement.

Despite occasional purges over the years, at the time of my arrival at St. James’, the basement was a mess. It was overflowing with old paint, leftover building materials, and all sorts of miscellaneous stuff that, for lack of a better storage location, had been dropped there and forgotten. Some things hadn’t been touched in at least a decade. In the office we joked about our occasional forays into the basement jungle: before venturing forth, the brave traveler would announce their imminent departure, so that a search party could be formed if they failed to return at the expected time.

A small group of us tossed a few things shortly after I arrived, but it wasn’t enough. The breaking point arrived last year, when the Flanagan family donated the crèche figures. There was no room at the inn for the Holy Family, and neither did there seem to be room in our basement. But we squeezed them in, knowing it was only a temporary solution.

The good news is that the basement has now been reclaimed, through the labors of many (especially Nick Monsarrat, our building go-to guy) over the last couple of months. After innumerable runs of garbage and recycling, the junk is gone. What’s left is organized and identifiable. Away with the clutter went a lot of dust. The new workbench (built by Eagle

Scout Sam Hoyt) is both functional and inviting. Perhaps most importantly, we now have room to store supplies for the paper pantry, St. James’ new outreach ministry that is now accepting donations.

I have been with you for just over 18 months, and I will almost certainly be wrapping up in April. I’ve been here a little longer than we all expected. But the delay gave us the time we needed to finish cleaning out the basement, and maybe that’s just what St. James’ needed. The church basement needed to be cleaned out, literally. But I see the basement as a metaphor for one important aspect of our work together.

One of the goals of the interim period is to deal with the “baggage” that a congregation might be carrying around, things such as old habits and expectations that are based on assumptions or conditions that no longer apply. When a person—or a congregation—is weighed down by old baggage, it’s awfully hard to pick up something new, no matter how wonderful that something new is. It might just be that St. James’ has now had time to toss out its old baggage. It just might be that St. James’ is now truly ready to pick up something new.

After an exceptionally wintry February, we really are edging into spring. Both literally and metaphorically, you may have some spring cleaning to do at home. Lent is a good time to consider ways of making room for the new by removing the old. Just please don’t put it in the church basement!

Vestry Update

March is a big month here at St. James'. The vestry is working on many things but the two major initiatives are to complete the Rector Search and to assist the Art in the Abbey committee to have a successful event.

On February 11th the Recruitment Committee turned over the final candidates' names to the Vestry. The Vestry has scheduled and is in the process of conducting in person interviews with the final candidates. A big thank you goes out to the Recruitment Committee for their hard work and diligence in completing the second process in a quick and efficient way.

After the selection is made by the Vestry, the Canon for Mission Leadership, Tim Hodapp is contacted, the Bishop is told, and then the Bishop gives permission for the Vestry to make an offer. Once the offer is accepted, a letter of agreement is drawn up by the vestry. Only after the letter of agreement is signed by all parties will the candidate's name be announced. So...keep praying and continue to be patient as the process of discernment unfolds.

The Vestry encourages you to be part of the fun of Art in the Abbey. There are many many small and large ways that each of us can help. Contact Chair Sandy Ouelette for a task. The committee needs help setting up, during the event on Friday night and Saturday, and really appreciates people to come and help clean up on Saturday afternoon to get the church ready for Sunday.

This is Lent. A time of prayer and self examination. I was reading a book by Tom Peters that offers leadership and management advice. And I have adapted his "Have you?" list to our final weeks in Lent. I would encourage each of us to ask ourselves –

Have you:

Hugged somebody today?

Thanked God for something in your life?

Given a smile to a stranger?

Called someone who lives alone or may be lonely?

Prayed for someone?

Thanked God for your health?

Read a short bit of scripture?

Hummed a hymn?

Prayed for a cause you care about?

Been silent when someone REALLY needed to be heard?

Blessings to you as we all observe a holy Lent.



Church School Nuggets

Each month we'll get a brief look at What's Been Happening In Church School

March

Pre-K-Grade 5: As February ends and March begins, our youngest learners will be hearing the stories of Jesus preparing for his passion and death. In the Lenten stories, we'll hear about Jesus' time in the desert, his true identity, respect for the house of God, and God's unrestricted love for the world.

Middle School

In addition to exploring the scriptures that our elementary school group investigates, the middle school class will explore the topics of temptation, guilt, forgiveness, jealousy, and self-esteem, and how they relate to Jesus' message of redemption and love. They'll work on goals for the observance of lent, and continue to share positive time together.

Gifts For Life: Sunday School Students Choose to Share Opportunity and Sustainability with Others

The children of St. James' voted during a recent Sunday School lesson on how to best use the money collected in God's jar. More than \$600 were collected over the course of last year, and the children had the chance to weigh in on how to use it best.

We presented them with a slate of options from the Gifts for Life Catalog put together by Episcopal Relief and Development. With the amount of money they had to put forward, the children could have purchased an entire cow for a family! Personally I thought the novelty of buying a cow would win out. If I were a kid being presented with the option of giving someone a cow, I would have jumped at the chance. But our children at St. James' wanted to make their money go as far as it could when helping other families and children around the world.

On Saturday morning, we will be making approximately 100 lunches (200 sandwiches) which we will deliver to Bushnell Park in Hartford to feed those in need. The distribution of the lunches follows "Church by the Pond". This is part of Christ Church Cathedral's "Church Street Eats" program. Some of our outreach funds are used to purchase supplies for these lunches.



May 3 – FOODSHARE'S WALK AGAINST HUNGER

May 9 – BISHOPS' 5K

ART IN THE ABBEY

How are the funds used?

Beginning this year, Art in the Abbey will be the primary source of funds for all of St. James' outreach efforts, which are summarized below. Please remember that, while Outreach has supported several programs and projects consistently for several years, there is always room for change. We ask your assistance in identifying current needs – especially in local and regional communities.

Locally, we have made financial contributions to the Glastonbury Fuel Bank, the Glastonbury Food Pantry, Naubuc Green (affordable housing complex), Naubuc School's Knapsack program (which sends home healthy foods each weekend for students in need), and the annual Martin Luther King Day celebration to support inclusiveness. Not appearing in budgeted costs, parishioners have also contributed generously to our Christmas Cheer project, which supports the town's efforts to assist those in need.

Regionally, we have contributed funds to Food Share (for a Place of Grace in Hartford), Heads Up! Hartford (see calendar section above), and to the Bishops' Fund for Children and Camp Washington. Un-budgeted items include the food contributions that you add to the baskets on Sunday morning – including the special "Kids helping Kids" drive in the spring, and Panera Bread contributions from Sunday night, most of which go to the MANNA Food Pantry in Hartford and are delivered by our faithful bread ministry volunteers. Some of the food contributions also go to the Glastonbury Food Pantry and to A Place of Grace in Hartford. In addition, parishioners staff FoodShare's "Turkey and Thirty" Thanksgiving drive at Whole Foods, and the Outreach Committee twice a year makes and delivers sandwiches for "Lunch in the (Bushnell) Park," a project of Church Street Eats at the Cathedral.

Internationally, we have had a particular commitment to two projects in Haiti. The first of these is the Holy Trinity School in Port-au-Prince (associated with Holy Trinity Cathedral). We have provided scholarship support for one student for several years, and occasional additional support for its lunch program. The second project is CODEP, COMprehensive DEvelopment Project, which combines environmental restoration of eroded mountainsides with agricultural training and income-producing opportunities for local families. Three members of our Outreach Committee (Barbara Massy, Blakeley Crevoiserat, and Barbara Buddington) have visited these projects (at their own cost), and would be delighted to talk with you at any time about them.

Not included in the budget is the parish support for the Christmas Child project ("the shoebox project")
